The purpose of HAWK's Nest is to support the health, safety, and social and emotional well-being of staff and students. We come together to build healthy relationships and teach social and emotional skills.


In this month's Hawks Nest we talked about the word "empathy," and practiced trying to figure out how someone else is feeling based on their facial expressions and body language.

News from Student Services



Relationships Emotions Academic Career Help

REACH classes with Mrs. Bishopric, School Counselor, promote knowledge, attitudes, and skills through instruction in three content areas: academic achievement, career development, and personal/social growth. This year, we meet with all students approximately once per month in the specials rotation to deliver the lessons.

Third Grade

Third Grade students have had a busy year in REACH so far! We began the year with a lesson introducing the School Counseling team at T.I.S. Students learned how to schedule an appointment with a counselor and all about how we are here to help kids manage their big feelings! During the month of October, we learned about the importance of making sure others feel included. We read a story called No Zombies Allowed by Matt Novak, during which different characters were gradually left out from a fun party. By the end of the story, the characters realized how it's much more fun when everyone is included! Students then had a chance to create their own sign to send a message to everyone at TIS that we include others.



In November, third grade students learned about Friendship. We had a lesson about all the ways you can be a good friend to someone, including caring about their feelings, treating each other with kindness, trying to resolve conflicts, and looking out for each others' safety. We then had a chance to then visit the smart board and look at many different scenarios to determine whether the scenario described a good friend or not such a good friend.

Fourth Grade

In fourth grade, we began the year with a review of the counselor's role. We also took some time to write a personal or academic goal that students want to achieve by the end of the school year! Students were excited to think about all they can accomplish by the end of fourth grade. In October, we moved into learning about ways to stop bullying. Students participated in a four corners activity where they were able to share if they have ever experienced certain bullying behaviors. Then, we took the time to develop a Stop Bullying Plan to decide what to do if they ever see someone being mean!





In November, fourth grade students also learned about how to resolve a conflict with a friend. The steps to resolving a conflict include:

- 1. Share your feelings and perspective.
- 2. Listen to your friend's feelings and perspective.
- 3. Make a plan for the future.
- 4. Apologize to one another.
- 5. Let it go and move on.

Students had a ton of fun writing and performing their own conflict resolution skits for the class! We learned a lot about how to solve some of those smaller disagreements we sometimes have with our friends or classmates.

Fifth Grade

In fifth grade, we began the year with a review of the counselor's role. We also took some time to write a personal or academic goal that students want to achieve by the end of the school year! Students were excited to think about all they can accomplish by the end of fifth grade. In October, students participated

in the Second Step bullying prevention unit lesson of how to recognize and respond to bullying behavior. We had a chance to practice and demonstrate how to report bullying and how to refuse to let bullying happen.



In November, we began to learn about stress. Students had a chance to take a stress inventory where they were able to identify sources of stress in their lives. We then reviewed some coping strategies that they can use when feeling stressed, including listening to music, talking to a grownup, playing a game with a friend, eating a healthy snack, and going outside.





Unified Arts Update for November 2023

Art ~ Library ~ Music ~ Physical Education

Ms. Ballard - Art

Third graders students will begin exploring the **Elements of Art** called **Space and Color.** They will create a **Paper Weaving.** We will be using the Element of **Color** to decorate our fall weavings. Fall pictures will be added to the paper weaving as well as the colored strips of paper. We will also be talking about repeat **Patterns of Color** in our weavings. **No smock is needed this month.**

Fourth graders will be working on Fire Prevention Posters during the month of November. We will be using crayons, markers or colored pencils for this project. No smock is needed this month. Students will be given all rules and a folder for their art work. Take your time and do a job you're proud of! Good Luck to all!

Fifth graders will be finishing up their Marionette bodies by the tenth of November. We will be taking a short break from our puppet making to work on Fire

Mrs. Hill - Library/Tech/STEM

Third grade: students will begin fiction genre studies at the intermediate school level. They will be learning about fantasy, mystery, historical fiction, science fiction, realistic fiction and traditional literature. Learning will be through a variety of methods, including: mini-movies from teachertube, powerpoint presentations, hands-on book sorting, genre bingo, Socrative reviews on the computer and interactive SmartBoard lessons. Third grade will also received the guidelines for the *voluntary* Library Book Challenges for this year. The library book challenges are based on reading from all different types of fiction genres.

Fourth grade and Fifth grade: have just finished reviewing nonfiction and students will now be moving on to nonfiction and reviewing the Dewey Decimal System. Fifth grade: just concluded a Library STEM Challenge in October to build a monster trap that did not hurt the monster. The students created some very interesting and innovative traps and demonstrated them to their classmates. Check out this short video clip from one STEM team. I will combine all of the videos taken for each STEM project by class. The iMovies



will then be uploaded to the class Library Google Classroom for viewing.



Fourth grade will show their STEM skills in the Library this month when they are challenged with **how to catch a turkey!**



Ms. Baker - Music & Chorus

<u>Grade 3 general music:</u> Third graders are learning to read and perform rhythms which contain eighth notes, quarter notes, quarter rests, and sixteenth notes, using boomwhackers and non-pitched percussion. The third graders are learning how to appropriately and respectfully sing their patriotic songs for our Veteran's Day assembly.

Grade 4 general music: The fourth graders just completed their studies of the music of Australia and are now working on the music of North America. Students learn about the music cultures, instruments and geography of this continent. The fourth graders are also learning to read and perform rhythms which contain eighth notes, quarter notes, quarter rests, and sixteenth notes, using boomwhackers and non-pitched percussion. They are learning how to appropriately and respectfully use a variety of musical instruments. They are also learning to sing their patriotic songs for our Veteran's Day assembly.

<u>Grade 5 general music:</u> The fifth graders are beginning their unit of study on music technology and composing and creating. They will compose and perform their own graphic notation pieces using vocal sounds and body percussion

as well as using our creativity boxes which are full of unique musical instruments. They have begun playing and learning about the ukuleles during their WIN block music time. Fun, Fun, Fun!! They are also learning to sing their patriotic songs for our Veteran's Day assembly.

Grade 4 Band: Band members have learned how to assemble, disassemble and clean their instruments safely. They are working hard to learn fingerings and proper embouchure (mouth position). It is so exciting to see and hear students enthusiastically learning how to play their instrument! Students have reviewed the values for whole and half notes and whole and half rests. Many Band students are already playing simple melodies such as "Hot Cross Buns" on their



instrument!

It is truly a joy to witness your children on their amazing journey of learning how to play an instrument solo and in small groups!

Grade 5 Band: All Band members are working hard to master melodies using the Concert Bb scale. Later on, we will add in Concert Eb and Concert F scales. Mike Hannickel's "Scale Preps for Beginning Band" helps Band students develop technique and listening skills. We use them for warm-ups and a fun way to start Band class. 

School Meals 2023-2024:

All students are eligible for a free breakfast each day. Students who qualify for free or *reduced-price meals* will also be eligible to receive one free lunch daily. ALL OTHER LUNCHES WILL BE CHARGED AT THE CURRENT LUNCH PRICE PER SCHOOL.

Payment for these lunches is the responsibility of the parent or guardian. The district participates in the National School Lunch Program and Breakfast Program which offers students nutritionally balanced meals daily. The lunch period is 30 minutes. Proper manners are always expected in the cafeteria. Free and reducedprice meals are available based on financial need. Information on this program may be obtained from the main office or Abby Kassman-Harned, the Food Service Director, at aharned@tolland.k12.ct.us or 870-6854.

We use a Point-of-Sale System that allows you to put money into an account for your child to purchase meals.

Scanning – All students will be scanned unless the parent or guardian opts out of this biometric identification procedure. When your child comes through the service line, he/she will scan his/her finger as a means of identification.

Payments – The cost of lunch at Birch Grove and Tolland Intermediate school is \$3.15. One school breakfast is free for all students. One milk is provided for each lunch and breakfast. Ala carte milk is \$0.75. You may sign up for "My School Account" and make your payments online. Your child may give payment along with a form to his/her classroom teacher to send to the office, or he/she may bring payment directly to the cashier in the cafeteria at mealtime. Your payment may take us a few days to process. It is important to keep a positive balance in your students' accounts.
