Unified Arts Update for January 2023

Art ~ Library ~ Music ~ Physical Education



Ms. Ballard - Art

Send in the smocks today!

Grade 3 During the month of January the third graders will be working on **Snowman** Locker Buddies. This project is made from 2 paper plates, yarn, and construction paper. Students will design a head of a snowman. Each snowman will have a pocket so students could store items inside of it.

In the middle of January, we will be starting a **Clay Coil project**. Students will design a **base shape** and finish the rest of the clay project by **coiling up clay, 4 or 5 coils high**. The clay project will then need to dry before firing it in the **kiln**. After the clay project has been fired we will glaze it with **two colors of glaze**.

Grade 4 The fourth graders will be starting up their **Styrofoam Printing Projects**. The first printing project will be a **proof print using black ink**. After the **proof** is made students can check their printing block for errors. Once the errors have been corrected, other colored prints can be made. Each print will be labeled with the student's name, number of the print, and a title of the print.

Grade 5 The fifth graders will be working finishing their 3D Letters. The letters are starting to come alive with color! Each student will draw ten things about them on their letter. After the drawing step is finished students will then begin to paint their letters using acrylic paint. This paint does not come out of clothes. All students are asked to wear a smock during class!

Hello Parents. In the art room, students will <u>not</u> be permitted to wear their winter coats in class. Please, send a smock to protect and cover your child's clothes. The art room is used by three different grades and there are messy projects going on all the time.

Mrs. Hill - Library Media

During the month of January, all TIS students will complete a **Destiny review**. This review is important to check for mid-year understanding. Destiny is the online card catalog that students use to look up library books. Lessons have been taught about identifying call numbers such as F for fiction. Students will be given time to practice Destiny skills, if needed.

Later in January, all TIS students will complete a **Nearpod lesson about the life, work and legacy of Martin Luther King, Jr**. The Nearpod lesson has articles to read, videos to watch and interactive questions, polls, and a drawing activity. TIS students will also contribute to a school-wide bulletin board with the themes of peace and kindness.

The students are learning to sing rounds, create harmonies, and dance while their classmates sing. We are looking forward to rescheduling our concert. Paperwork will be coming home soon.

January Reading Thoughts from the TIS Reading Department

Teacher Tricks to Improve Reading Comprehension at Home

You may not have signed up for recess duty or chalk stains on your pants, but if you'd like to improve your child's reading comprehension skills, you should start thinking like a teacher—and using some of the same tools teachers use in the classroom. Teacher-trainer and expert on young adult literacy Hal W. Lanse says "parents *must* educate themselves about the strategies teachers use, because the preparation for reading needs to begin long before formal instruction commences."

Many effective comprehension teaching strategies come naturally to parents. Lanse explains that a simple encouragement like "Norah, tell Dad what we did in the park this afternoon," for example, builds "an early understanding of how narratives work." But other instructional techniques aren't as intuitive. Here are three classroom tricks to use at home.

Set Kids Up for Reading Success

If you were going to build a house, you wouldn't just grab a pile of bricks and go at it. You'd learn about the tools and materials you'd need for the job, go over the architectural plans you'd be using, and hopefully take a basic course in construction techniques! In other words, you'd gather all the information and training you needed before you ever picked up a hammer. The same principle applies to reading. Teachers call it "front-loading," and it means preparing kids for reading by giving them tools that apply to a specific text.

Before reading a book of ancient Greek myths, for instance, first talk to your child about what myths are. Describe how ancient cultures used mythology to explain natural phenomena. Spend some time on the Internet, looking up the names and characteristics of the major gods and goddesses in the Greek pantheon. If you've bought your child a book about insects, look through the text for unfamiliar words like "antennae" and "wing

case" and explain them before you read. Don't forget to activate knowledge your child already has, too. Talk about the insects that live in your backyard. Take a walk outside to observe them. Though it may seem like a lot of work, these preparatory steps can really pay off in deeper comprehension later on.

Think Like a Reader, Talk Like a Reader

Just reading to or with your children isn't enough. Teachers are experts at "think-alouds:" verbal explanations of the ideas, images, connections, and questions that go through their minds as they read. This might sound daunting, but it's easy to do once you get into the habit of paying attention to your own thought processes. Here's what a think-aloud might sound like:

It says here Luisa's face is turning red. That could mean she's feeling embarrassed or angry. I need to read ahead to find out. Ah! Here it says "Luisa wanted to disappear whenever her mom told the story about her getting lost at the zoo." That tells me why Luisa's face went red. It also tells me a bit about her mom—she might not realize how Luisa feels.

Lanse agrees. "Good readers," he says, "create a running video in their heads of the stories they're reading. Parents should take turns with their children describing the images they have in their heads as they read a story... the big secret to good reading comprehension is *talk*, *talk*."

Turn Your Child Into the Teacher

The classroom technique known as "reciprocal teaching" sounds complex but isn't. The idea behind this strategy is for adults and children reading together to take turns playing the role of the teacher. As you read with your child, take turns summarizing, coming up with questions, clarifying confusing ideas, and predicting what will happen next. This is a sophisticated teaching principle that's really fun to execute: children love being put in the driver's seat and getting to say things like "Okay, Mom, summarize what happened on this page!"

Captain Underpants=Comprehension Success

Lanse has one last tip for parents. "The biggest problem in the struggle to read well," he says, is "boring materials. Boys are the most resistant readers and we must put books in their hands that they like: scary stories, science fiction, sports books, gross-out humor. Yes, I'm saying you should buy your sons Captain Underpants!"
